In 1839 ______ Person in room-male _____ Sutter arrived on the shore of the American River near its confluence with the Sacramento River. With the promise of a Mexican ______ grant, Sutter and his landing party established Sutter's location . As the settlement grew and became Adjective , it attracted other profession-plural looking for <u>Noun Plural</u>. Sutter and the people he <u>Verb Past Tense</u> created a type of business _____ center in the area, but it was the ______ Rush in 1848 that created the City of Sacramento. When ______Repeat Last Noun_____ was discovered in the nearby foothills by James Marshall, local merchant other person in room Brannan rushed to open a store near the Sacramento River to take advantage of the convenient waterfront location. What was then called Sutter's <u>place</u> was soon known as the City of Sacramento. The city rapidly grew into a <u>Verb Present ends in ING</u> center for miners outfitting themselves for the <u>funny noun</u> fields. Early Sacramento's waterfront location was prime for <u>Verb Present ends in ING</u> success, but was prone to severe flooding. The city also fell victim to repeated <u>Noun Plural</u> engulfing its hastily constructed buildings composed mainly of wood and <u>Noun</u>. In 1850 the <u>Adjective</u> city experienced its first Adjective flood and in 1852 the city was again wiped out by high <u>Noun</u>. It was apparent that drastic measures would have to be taken if it was to be <u>Verb Past Tense</u>.

In 1853 a <u>Animal</u> project was proposed to raise the city above the flood level. The <u>Adjective</u> and expensive proposal was not <u>Adverb</u> accepted until another devastating flood <u>Verb Past Tense</u> through the city in 1862. Within a few years, thousands of cubic yards of <u>Noun</u> were brought in on wagons and the daring scheme to raise the <u>first world problem</u> level began. The original <u>repeat last</u> <u>first world problem</u> level can be seen throughout Old Sacramento <u>Preposition</u> the boardwalks and in <u>place-plural</u>.

The center of the <u>acronym</u> district gradually moved east and the original part of the city on Sutter's Embarcadero became known as the <u>Adjective Ends in EST</u> skid row west of Chicago. <u>Vocation - Plural</u>, ministers, politicians and others spoke out against <u>boring daily task</u> in this part of the city, but little was done to change the <u>Adjective</u> conditions.

In the mid-1960s, a plan was set forth to <u>Verb Base Form</u> the area and through it, the first <u>funny</u>
district in the West was created. Today, with historic buildings, Old Sacramento has
more <u>Noun Plural</u> of historic value condensed into its <u>number</u> acres than most areas of similar
size in the <u>location</u> . Registered as a National and California Historic <u>fun event</u> , the properties in
the district are <u>Adverb</u> owned by private <u>animal-plural</u> , with individual businesses leasing shops
and <u>place-plural</u> . The area has flourished and is once again a thriving <u>Verb Present ends in ING</u> trade
center.
